


### Budget context: revenue/expenditure

### 2025-26 Budget: continuity vs change

#### More continuity than change

- "Reprioritisations" = 2.35% (\$119 million) of total aid in 2025-26
- Includes cuts/re-profiling of UN, global health and global education programs

### ...but a major increase in funding to the World Bank's International Development Association (IDA)


- \$660 million contribution to IDA21 (2026-2028)
- +20% real increase on IDA20 (2023-2025)
- presented as a Pacific investment, not a global program

### Labor's four aid budgets




### Aid and defence: comparison

**PCIFP** = 'Pacific Climate Infrastructure Financing Partnership' (up to \$350 million)



### A (predictably) heavy demand for grants...

AIFFP approved/announced projects – no. of projects by capital source as at 30 June 2024



# ...and (beyond PNG) a weak demand/capacity for borrowing

# Bias towards grants even stronger when looking at AIFFP disbursements

2023/24 disbursements:

- Grants spent = \$101 million (\$191m-\$90m)
- Loans spent = \$34 million (\$254m-\$220m)

= 3:1 grant/loan spending ratio

### More grant funding will be required

AIFFP **establishment** loan/grant ratio = **3:1** (\$3 billion in NC loans; \$1 billion in grants)

AIFFP **commitment** loan/grant ratio w/o unannounced + PCIFP and TA = 3:1.3 (almost 2:1)

AIFFP **commitment** loan/grant total ratio with unannounced + PCIFP + TA = **3:2.3** (almost **1:1**)

If this commitment ratio persists, AIFFP would need another \$1.3 billion in grant funding to reach its \$3 billion lending cap.





#### Context

"Over the last decade, transparency has become worse in all areas, and is now very low throughout all aspects of the aid cycle. From a transparency perspective this is not in any way adequate."


### 2025 aid transparency audit method

- ➤IATI and portal data used for sample frame
- riangle sample of countries and regions from previous years for comparability
- riteria:
  - Project description
  - Planned dates
  - Project budget
  - Previous financial year expenditure
- revaluate availability of various types of documents from various sources (only presenting on 2 types today)


% of investments covered on aid program web pages, 2022





## The availability of basic investment information has improved markedly...


Average investment information availability across all information types



With more years of data on the portal, Australian aid transparency would score 100% on our historic metric for basic information!

## ...but the availability of investment documentation remains variable

- Continued commitment to adding more data to the portal
- > Improved consistency of investment documentation availability
- More accessible data downloads



#### **Figure 1: OECD donors - Cutters**



#### Figure 2: OECD donors - Non-cutters


