

Aisiyah: 99 years of women's empowerment

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The second in our series of [Aid Profiles](#) is now online: on Indonesia's longest-serving women's organisation, [Aisiyah](#).

Aisiyah currently works with the Australian aid program to deliver the Empowering Indonesian Women for Poverty Reduction (MAMPU) program, specialising in delivering maternal and reproductive health services.

But this is not the first time that Aisiyah has worked closely with Australia. After the 2004 bombing of the Australian Embassy in Jakarta, Aisiyah was charged with running the Victim Assistance Program, providing substantial support to those who were badly injured or lost family members in the bombing.

It's a fascinating story of how Australia has worked together with an Islamic women's organisation that is 15 million members strong, and of the impact of an act of terror both on the Australia-Indonesia relationship and on the individuals affected.
